## State and Society in Modern China: From Opium War to the Present Spring 2024

 This course combines lectures and seminars to provide upper-level undergraduate students a comprehensive understanding of the history of modern China. It proceeds in a chronological manner to enable discussions and reflections on the historical contingency, alternatives, and intended and unintended consequences of historical events.

## East Asian Civilization, 1800-present

Spring 2024

• This course explores the historical trajectory of China, Japan, and Korea in the 19<sup>th</sup> and 20<sup>th</sup> centuries and the ways they shaped each other's modern fate. The course is designed into six modules, each including multiple lectures and one discussion sessions. The course employs primary and secondary sources, including visual and cinematic materials, and diversified class activities to facilitate undergraduate's interest of inquiries into a broad array of topics.

## China's Long Twentieth Century: Economic and Social Changes

Fall 2023

 A seminar course for graduate and upper-level undergraduate students. It examines modern Chinese history from the late Qing (1870-1911) to the turn of the twentiethfirst century and introduces students to major historical debates that have defined the central questions of the field.
